Learning Modalities on Display at the UofM Language Fair

The annual UofM Language Fair offers activities for students earning high school credit in a world language, no matter the course level nor their linguistic proficiency. An overview of the events at the Language Fair will be provided, followed by discussion on how these events can be and/or are being incorporated into lesson plans to encourage students to have fun with the language they are currently studying.

Creating engaging lessons that save you time and lower your stress!

This session focuses on using tech tools and low-tech skills to engage your students while saving you time by streamlining checks for understanding, capturing students' interest and creating a supportive environment. These lessons are inspired by a variety of professionals and research via a hybrid approach to Comprehensible Input, Storytelling, Free Choice Reading, and Homework Choice. Learn how to automate activities via Google Classroom and Google Forms, ClassKick, Nearpod and a variety of other tools to keep you from getting stressed out as the school year dwindles away! Examples in French, but applicable to all languages. Language focus: French/All languages

 How Treating Your Students Like Rats Can Improve Higher Level Language Abilities

Kenneth Stacey, Memphis University School (Room 220)

A model is presented for getting students to do a greater percentage of proficiency-related homework. The model uses fundamental principles of operant conditioning. The session includes a review of the basic concepts of operant conditioning, a description of the rationale and procedures, and the presentation of the results of a semester-long study in which the model was used successfully. Issues and areas for further research are also presented. *Language focus: All Languages*

Interacting in the Language: Connecting Course Goals to Communication
 David Julseth, Belmont University

How can we connect conversations and writing practice with course goals to put grammar and vocabulary to practice? In addition, many instructors give credit for conversations in the language outside of class. How can we encourage students to be responsible for preparing prior and reflecting afterwards? This session discusses ways to get students interacting inside and outside of class using language skills. Activities can be adjusted to level and languages taught (examples in Spanish).

How can I keep up my level of language if I'm only teaching Levels 1 and 2? Authentic resources are not just for use in our classes, but ways for us to increase our own input so we can, in turn, increase our level of input for our students in order to comfortably stay in the target language 90% of the class time. Increasing our input also helps keep us current in the target language, which helps us and our students be relevant to other native speakers. This session will provide specific resources for language teachers, how to curate those resources for use in class, and how to match the intercultural competencies standards with these resources.
